
**REGENTS EXAMS (Safety Net option)**: If you are a student with disabilities, you need a 55 on all 5 exams OR a 45 on 2 of your exams, with a 65 or more on the rest. To pass, hit the orange Regents exams ship

> If you are a general education student and score a 62-64 on TWO of your Regents exams, you can talk to your principal to change your grade. That's called an appeal, and if it's accepted, you can get a Local diploma.





**International schools** serve newly arrived ELLs. They are part of a network that integrate different language levels in all classes and use project-based learning.



ALTERNATIVE ROUTES NYC has alternative schools you can apply for. Some have


different requirements for graduation. They might be a good fit for you if you're worried you won't be able to get a diploma.

**Transfer schools** are small schools for students who have had at least one year of high school, and have dropped out or fallen behind in credits.
